## Family Experience with MAiD

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The following discussion questions are provided as an additional educational tool to accompany this fireside chat video. ### Questions:

- What stood out the most to you in this interview? Why?
- Why do you think people might choose MAiD?
- What do you think family members might find most ethically challenging if their loved one chooses MAiD?
- Buffy talks about coming to peace with and respecting a family member's decision to go through MAiD, even if you don't necessarily agree with their decision.
  - What are some of the things that might help family members prepare for, and come to peace with, a loved one's decision to go through MAiD?
- What can health care providers do to support family members throughout the process?
- Do you agree that conversation around death and dying has become taboo and anxiety provoking for many?
  - O Why do you think some might find it difficult to talk about death and dying?
- What makes a good death?
- Identify and discuss some of the things that health care providers need to be sensitive to when communicating with family members of patients going through MAiD.
